Cottage Meetings begin in earnest this month and are the way we can think creatively and supportively with one another. The search team for the permanent Music Director (Lori Maddox, Judy Shaw, Bob Fraley, Sam Rutledge and Kris Olsen) is meeting weekly. Food on Sundays encourages everyone to stay and strengthen community. And we welcome in new members on the 5th!

In the words of the Terma community: "May our eyes remain open even in the face of tragedy; may we not become disheartened. May we find in the dissolution of apathy and denial the cup of the broken heart; [and there] may we discover the light of the fire burning..."

Dear UUCE,

The month of March brings us the theme “abiding”. The definition of this word given by Miriam Webster includes “to endure without yielding,” “to bear patiently,” and “to wait for” as well as “to remain stable or fixed in a state.” And isn’t exactly this – both definitions of this word - what is called for in our shared moment in history? The stability of our love for the vast diversity of life in all its wondrous expressions. The fixed nature of our convictions and our principled calling to account those deeds that would seek to shake our commitment. To remain stable. To remain centered. To remain calm.

I recently stumbled into my own daily spiritual practice in my introverted quest for quiet. I was drawn to sign up for a silent retreat – something I had been wanting to experience since my mid-20s but never made time for – and in the five days of that retreat, quite by accident on my part, I was introduced to meditation. I haven’t looked back.

Without meditation, I don’t know how I would have made it through the last few months.

On a drizzly morning in January, a Rabbi told an assembled crowd that in the Jewish tradition, “we are forbidden to despair.” I draw great strength from this statement of abiding faith, for truly, there is so much work to do both out in the world and within ourselves, we cannot afford to despair.

By the time you read this, the Spiritual Practices class will have met for several sessions. The sessions continue through the months of March and April, Sundays from 12:30-1:30 in the Chapel and they are open to everyone. You are invited to drop in to one class period, or to attend weekly, if you have curiosity or interest in developing your own set of spiritual practices.

Also coming up in March, Everyday Intuition, with Robert Elliot, a speaker, presenter, facilitator, and seeker who has come to understand the importance of listening to the still small voice within. (March 4th, 10:00-12:30 in the Sanctuary – bring a pot luck dish to share after the talk)

Singing as Spiritual Practice continues through the month of March, Sundays from 4:00-5:30, with Kris Jones. A talented and joyful free spirit, Kris brings to her students over 30 years of experience. As she states on her website: “The human body is a beautiful musical instrument. We live inside it, so we are only vaguely aware of its potential for sound-making. Yet this instrument is the first thing we employ as a human being – on entering this world, we take a deep breath and YELL, thus opening the door to a lifelong relationship with sound.” Come explore that relationship in a safe, fun, supportive environment – no experience necessary!

Please also save the date for April 29th, a White Allies and Accomplices workshop will be held here at UUCE, facilitated by Dr. Bevyn Rowland. Dr. Rowland is a Licensed Clinical Psychologist and Department Chair of Human Development at Pacific University. She is also a member at the Social Justice Leadership Institute (WA). Bevyn writes: “My role is to facilitate understanding of helpful/unhelpful behaviors and thoughts, understand the utility and purpose

of emotive and spiritual experiences, and help folks move toward healthy change or help grow what is already working well. My approach to therapeutic work refracts through a social justice lens, which acknowledges the impact of systemic oppression, and considers what kind of changes are safe and helpful across varying cultural contexts. Just like my clients, I am a human with inter-sectional identities. As such, I am continuously working toward social equity by examining my own privilege and leveraging power through consciousness raising, personal/professional development trainings, and engaging in Courageous Conversations.” Mark your calendars and please join us next month for some of these courageous conversations.

Also in March, we will explore the theme of “abiding” with people of all ages in the SpiritJam classrooms. A program designed for participants of all ages and ability levels, SpiritJam encourages you to engage with the concepts presented in the sermons in a playful, creative, and active way. Storytelling Jam, Blackfeet Amends Jam, Science Experiment Jam, and Improv Jam are just a few examples of what’s in store for people who choose to participate in SpiritJam on Sunday mornings!

High School youth group is gearing up for Spring Con, their bi-annual conference with UU youth from across the Pacific Northwest District, held April 7-9th. Not long after that conference, it will be time for senior youth to bridge out of the youth group classroom and into the larger congregation. Save the date and be sure to be there for the youth-led bridging service, June 4th.

Middle School youth interested in participating in youth group, a new middle school class is set to meet twice a month on 1st and 3rd Sundays, beginning April 2nd. In the meantime, sign up to participate in the middle school retreat, April 23-24th at Opal Creek wilderness. Deadline for registration is March 23rd. For more information, contact DRE Katy Siepert.

As you can see, we persist... life here at UUCE goes on in endless song. 

Our Money

We are now seven twelfths (58.3%) of the way completed the church year from a bookkeeping point of view. So as this is the March Newsletter you will see the information for the close of January. Total income is still running well ahead of the 58.3% at 85.51% of the budgeted amount. Fundraising has brought in about two thirds of our annual goal but presently there are no committed projects to complete this goal. Another event or two such as an auction or a "grill-off" are needed. My experience is that they are fun as well as a significant contribution to the church. In fact, the fun is probably more important than the money in many senses.

Our pledges are coming in okay at this point but if we can complete our pledges as we completed them last year we will be marginally okay for the year but if we come up short we could end up with a more significant loss than has been our plan all year. So those of you with outstanding pledges and not a pattern of paying them so far this year should expect a reminder this spring. And all of you who have contributed, THANK YOU VERY MUCH, you are always welcome to give extra. It will not be wasted. You can see our Profit and Loss for the first seven months of our Fiscal Year below.
